Health and safety committee (HSC) and health and safety (HS) representative training

HSC co-chairs and HS representatives are required to receive mandatory training on the duties and functions of their respective roles. This training is now available through <u>approved training providers</u>.

All HSC members are encouraged to attend the mandatory approved training as part of their 16 hour/two shift annual training allowance.

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Alberta

Incidents recently reported to the OHS Contact Centre

These are summaries of selected work-related incidents reported to Alberta OHS. The summaries are based on information obtained as soon as possible after the incident. Because they are being investigated by the employers involved, no additional information will be provided. Use these reported incidents as ways to start conversations in your workplaces about how they could be prevented.

Fall from ladder

A worker fell from a ladder and landed feet first on uneven ground. The fall resulted in a broken leg requiring surgery. *Construction and Construction Trade Services*

Steel fragment enters leg

While using a sledgehammer on a piece of heavy equipment, a steel fragment entered the worker's leg after piercing both the insulated bib coveralls and Nomex[®] coveralls worn by the worker. The worker was admitted to hospital for surgery. *Mining and Petroleum Development*

Worker pinned

A worker was pinned underneath a 20-inch pipe that had slipped off a pipe stand. The worker was transported to hospital and required surgery. *Mining and Petroleum Development*

Explosion

During maintenance at a manufacturing facility, a large explosion occurred, resulting in injuries to several workers, including one who was airlifted to hospital. *Manufacturing, Processing and Packaging*

Hand caught in auger

A worker was clearing snow from an auger while it was still running. The worker's hand became stuck. EMS responded and released the worker from the auger. The worker was transported to the hospital for treatment of hand injuries. *Provincial and Municipal Government, Education and Health Services.*
